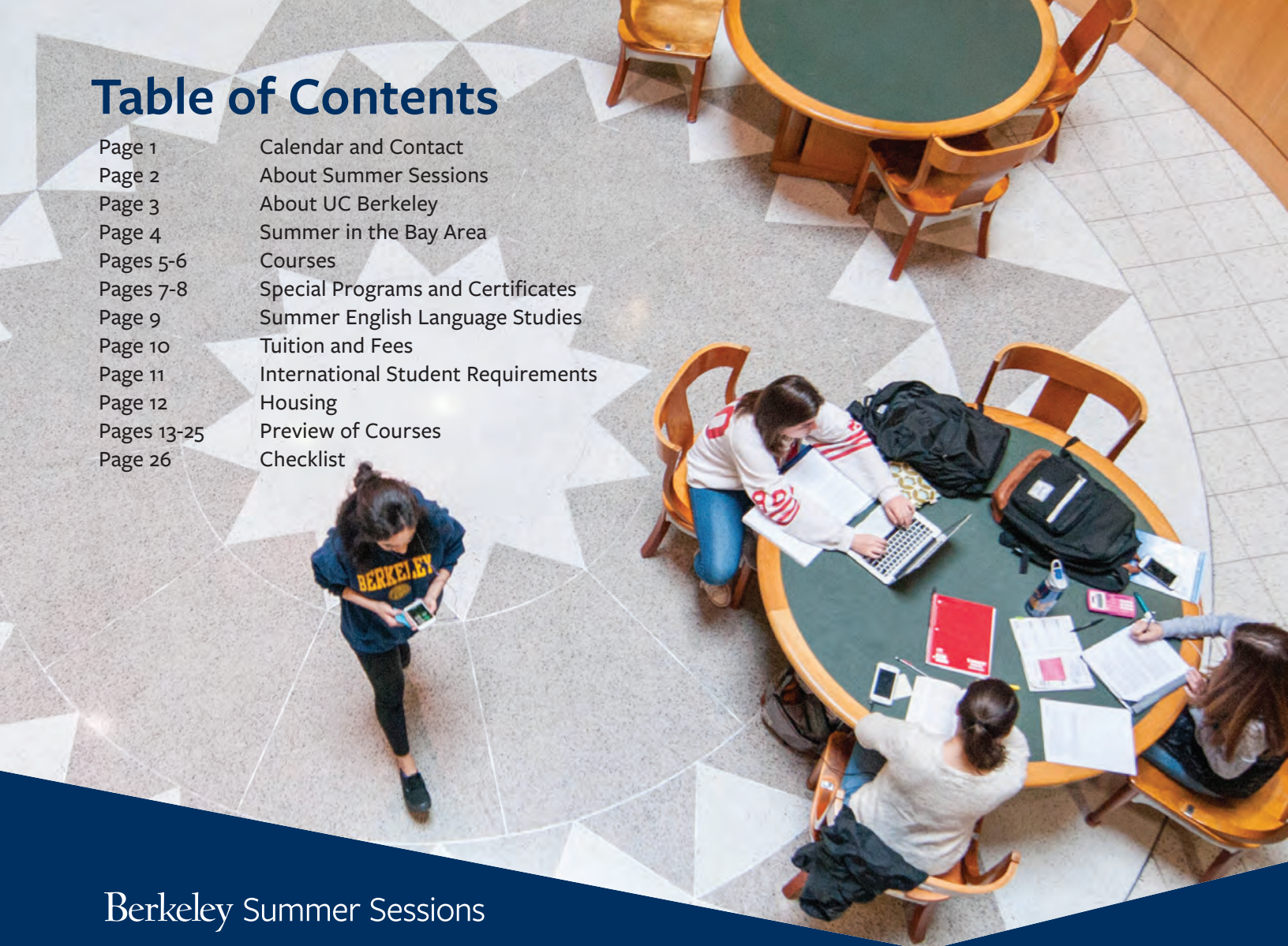

About UC Berkeley

A Tradition of Excellence

The University of California was founded in 1868, born out of a vision in the State Constitution of a university that would “contribute even more than California’s gold to the glory and happiness of advancing generations.” The first campus—envisioned as a “City of Learning”—was established at Berkeley, near the San Francisco Bay. Today the world’s premier public university and a wellspring of innovation, UC Berkeley occupies a 1,232-acre campus with a park-like 178-acre central core. It is the oldest of 10 University of California campuses.

With its mission of teaching, research, and public service, Berkeley, or “Cal” as alumni know it, is one of the world’s most distinguished institutions of higher education. It is renowned for the excellence of its faculty and students, the scope of its research and publications, the size and quality of its library collections, and the excellence of its laboratory and educational facilities.

Academics

Berkeley academic programs are recognized internationally for their excellence. You can expect a rigorous academic experience during your summer studies. The accelerated instruction of Summer Sessions means that you will learn a semester’s worth of material in just one summer. Berkeley courses are known for an engaged learning style where you interact frequently with the instructor and other students. With continuous assessment, you are evaluated over the duration of the course through work such as quizzes, exams, lab assignments, papers, attendance, and class participation.



Academic Support

Berkeley offers a range of support services to help you achieve academic success. Academic advisers are available to answer questions about selecting courses. Instructors hold faculty office hours where you can discuss course material. The Student Learning Center provides tutoring and study groups for Summer Sessions students.

Libraries

UC Berkeley is home to one of the finest research libraries in the U.S., encompassing over twelve million items housed in over twenty libraries, along with access to an extensive array of online resources.

Health and Wellness

Students have access to medical and mental health services provided by University Health Services, a fully accredited facility staffed by board-certified physicians, nurse practitioners, physician assistants, a nutritionist, and more.

In addition, membership to the campus Recreational Sports Facility is included in fees. Rec Sports members enjoy access to two recreation centers, four pools, free drop-in group exercise classes, discounts on personal training, outdoor programs, and more.

Campus Safety

UC Berkeley has its own dedicated, full-service state police department that operates 24 hours a day, seven days a week for all UC Berkeley properties in the Bay Area. The department, in partnership with Campus Parking & Transportation Services, offers free Night Safety Services, including the BearWALK escort service and evening shuttles. The Berkeley campus partners with the Nixle company to deliver safety messages to you via opt-in text, email, or both in the event of an immediate threat to safety or health affecting the campus community. Summer in the Bay Area

Enjoy summer in the vibrant San Francisco Bay Area! Centrally located, Berkeley is just 25 minutes from downtown San Francisco and within an hour of most local attractions, including national parks, museums, shopping, restaurants, and nightlife.

Things to Do

See the sights. Walk across the Golden Gate Bridge, stroll down twisty Lombard Street, ride a cable car, visit lively Chinatown, and take a tour of Alcatraz Island.

Eat delicious food. The Bay Area is a food lover's paradise, with fine local restaurants, farmer's markets, and a thriving food truck scene.

Celebrate with the locals. Enjoy music, art, and cultural events, such as the Outside Lands Music and Arts Festival, Oakland Art + Soul Festival, and SF Pride Celebration

Visit a museum. Experience some of California's best art, natural history, culture, and science museums, many of which have discounted admission for students.

Get outdoors. The Bay Area has some of the most beautiful parklands in the nation, including the Marin Headlands, Muir Woods National Monument, and Point Reyes National Seashore.

Did You Know?

Summer Sessions students receive a public transit card that allows free use of the local bus system, including buses to downtown San Francisco!



Courses

Choose from undergraduate courses in more than 80 subjects, including arts, engineering, humanities, natural sciences, social sciences, and the professional fields of architecture, business, education, public health, and social welfare.

Courses are offered in three, six, eight, 10, or 12-week intensive sessions. All courses are regular university courses and are recorded on an official UC Berkeley transcript.

While completion of summer courses does result in a UC Berkeley transcript, participating in this education program does not in itself provide preference in admission to the University of California.

Enrollment

Enrollment for Summer Sessions opens in February. Visit summer.berkeley.edu/international for instructions for visiting international students.

Prerequisites

Many Summer Sessions courses have prerequisites which are indicated in the course description. Before enrolling, check that you meet all prerequisites for each course. If unsure whether you meet a prerequisite, contact the course department or instructor and be prepared to provide documentation of your previous coursework (e.g. syllabi, course descriptions, transcripts).





Course Numbering

Each UC Berkeley course listing includes a number that indicates whether a course is undergraduate, graduate, or professional level. Use the chart below to determine the level of your course.

Units of Credit

UC Berkeley is on a 15-week semester calendar. During the semester, one unit represents three hours of work per week by the student, including both class attendance and preparation. Laboratory, discussion, quiz, or review sessions may or may not be given unit value. To estimate the amount of work for summer courses, refer to the chart below.

Architecture and Design Programs

Disc* (Design & Innovation for Sustainable Cities) is an immersive five week summer program that explores an interdisciplinary and multi-scalar approach to design and analysis in the urban environment. Through seminars and lectures, studio workshop sessions, site visits and fieldwork, students will develop innovative solutions to tackle the urgent challenges global cities are facing today, and to shape their future. Disc* is intended for currently enrolled college students from all majors, with or without design experience.

The **Summer [IN]STITUTE** is an intensive six week course that is designed to introduce participants to the material and culture of architecture, landscape architecture or sustainable city planning, and geared toward those who are considering graduate study in those fields. Participants who have no prior design experience enroll in [IN]ARCH, [IN]CITY or [IN]LAND; architecture students or recent graduates with design experience enroll in [IN]ARCH ADV. All four cohorts offer the opportunity to explore the methods of the disciplines, experience the culture of design studios, connect with faculty, and develop a polished portfolio for graduate school applications.

Race and the Law

Jointly offered by the departments of African American Studies and Ethnic Studies, the certificate program develops understanding of the fundamental interconnections between race and the law within and beyond the U.S. You will examine how law has been instrumental in codifying racial difference and racial hierarchies, as well as how racialized peoples have used the law as an instrument of protest and social change. Interdisciplinary courses will cover a wide range of fields, and possible topics include The Carceral State; The Civil Rights Movement; Race and Immigration; Social Movements and the Law; Citizenship; Indigenous Legal Systems; Law and Literature; and Race, Environmental Justice and the Law.

This chart represents the estimated tuition and fees for a visiting international student taking two courses (three units each) during a six-week session.

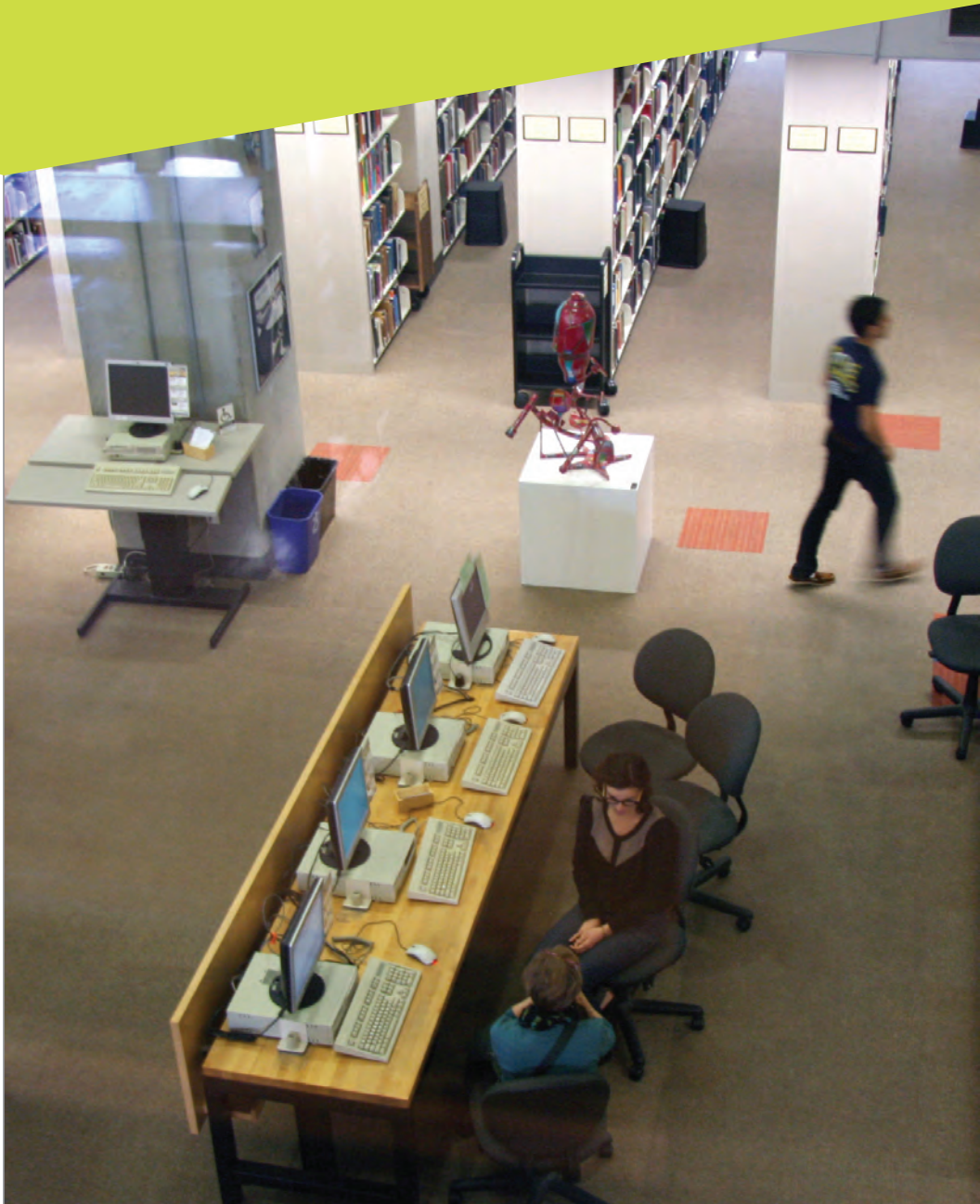

Course Materials and Service Fee

Some departments charge a Course Materials and Service Fee for specific classes, such as those with science or computer labs, photography labs, physical education courses, and art supplies. The Course Materials and Service Fee is non-refundable and should be noted in the Class Schedule at classes.berkeley.edu.



Cancellation Fee

Cancellation means dropping all courses in every session in which you are enrolled **before instruction begins in your first course**. You are charged a \$100 cancellation fee. Visiting international students who have received an I-20 will be charged \$500.

** Summer tuition and fees must be paid in full within seven calendar days after enrollment, or you will be dropped from your class(es).

International Student Requirements

Full-Time Student Status

Berkeley International Office encourages all international students to enroll full-time and obtain the appropriate student visa status for study. In most cases, visiting international students should apply for an F-1 visa. International students with an F-1 I-20 certificate of eligibility document issued by UC Berkeley must be enrolled full time for the entire summer session period noted on your I-20. Full-time student status varies depending on what session(s) you enroll in. For details, see internationaloffice.berkeley.edu/students/summer/full-time.

English Proficiency Requirement

If you are from a country in which the official language is not English, you are required to submit official evidence of English language proficiency. All applicants must meet the English Proficiency Requirement regardless of citizenship, unless one of the following items applies:

- You are from a country exempt from the English Proficiency Requirement
- You enroll exclusively in Summer English Language Studies courses
- Your university has been granted an exemption based on an affiliation agreement

Visa and Immigration

International (non-immigrant) students coming to the United States from abroad with the primary intention of study should normally obtain F-1 visa status for Summer Sessions (Students who wish to attend in J-1 visa status should review information here: internationaloffice.berkeley.edu/students/summer/need_docs). To apply for an F-1 visa at a U.S. Embassy or Consulate in your country, request an F-1 I-20 document when you register for Berkeley Summer Sessions by completing the VSIS task in CalCentral. The Berkeley International Office is the responsible office for issuing I-20s.

International students coming from abroad are required to have valid visas in their passports to enter the United States (Canadian citizens do not need visas, but do need the I-20 for entry in student status). For more information, see internationaloffice.berkeley.edu/students/summer.

The Berkeley International Office only provides visa advising and assistance to visiting international students who enter the United States using a UC Berkeley visa document (I-20 or DS-2019).

Health Insurance

Medical care in the United States can be very expensive. Hospital costs can average \$4,000-\$5,000 USD per day. Health insurance coverage is required to meet these unexpected expenses. You should purchase a health insurance policy before you arrive in the United States. This policy should cover all medical and hospital costs, or provide you with a minimum of \$50,000 for each accident or illness, have a deductible of \$500 or less for each accident or illness, cover at least 75% of hospital and physician costs from the time you leave your current residence to the day you plan to return. Students in J-1 visa status are required to maintain adequate health insurance for the duration of their program. Information about J-1 health insurance requirements can be found at internationaloffice.berkeley.edu/j_insurance.



Housing

A variety of housing is available for your time at Berkeley Summer Sessions. Popular accommodations fill quickly, so make your housing arrangements as early as possible.

University Housing: Residence Halls & Apartments

All students registered in Summer Sessions courses are eligible to live in University Housing and are encouraged to apply. University Housing provides convenience, safety, and success you won't find off-campus.

Residence Halls include shared lounges and communal bathrooms with all gender and single gender floors. Apartments are single gender that share a bathroom, kitchen, and living room. All locations are furnished, equipped with wireless internet, an Academic Center, custodial services, and more! Additionally, live-in Residential Life staff provide community development activities, wellness programs, and social outings to ensure a successful and fulfilling summer.

The included meal plan offers flexibility at our dining commons and on-campus retail locations; all of which feature a variety of cuisines and dietary options. Take advantage of the many benefits of living on-campus and apply now! Assignments are provided first come, first served.

International House

Located in the southeast foothills of the Berkeley campus, International House is a historic and architecturally striking campus housing facility and intercultural program center for U.S. and international students. At I-House, you will spend your summer living with a diverse group of residents, including graduate students, laboratory researchers, visiting scholars, and exchange students from around the world. To qualify for summer residency, you must be over the

age of 18 and enrolled in full-time study or research at UC Berkeley or a nearby, approved educational institution.

I-House offers fully furnished double and single room accommodations. Floors are co-ed, with the exception of the 8th floor Women's Hall. The I-House room and board fee for the summer includes 10 meals per week in the I-House Dining Commons. I-House is within walking distance of the central campus and is near downtown Berkeley. I-House provides a variety of

spaces for work and recreation, including a library, resident lounges, game rooms, and a computer center. Conference rooms and a small kitchen are available for residents' special events. The International House Café is open every day for meeting with friends over coffee. A broad program of activities and outings is also offered throughout the summer.
